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CEO's Statement

Multicultural Cumbria

Coming out of lockdown and adjusting to 'normal' life again has been like starting all over again.

Covid-19 highlighted the health disparities for diasporas. However, the need to connect with people from their own communities has been more in focus than ever. Our work to use translated information shows that communication is essential to reach diasporas from migrant, refugee and asylum-seeking communities especially.

The Ukraine war and the Channel boat crossings have had a big impact on Cumbria. Donations came pouring in for Ukraine and the challenges of people seeking asylum in Carlisle hotels has touched home in a way that it never has before.

The two Digital Assistants, funded by the DWP Kickstart Scheme for six months, was a great boost for updating information on our website. Especially the translations and keeping abreast of activities being offered for people seeking asylum.

Our Asylum and Refugee Coordinator role was funded by Cumbria Community Foundation for six months. A vital role in connecting and supporting people who have experienced trauma, mental health with added language barriers.

These are people who are vulnerable, yet want to embrace the hope of freedom in a safe and compassionate country.

Delivering Health Activity and Food (HAF)

It has been a year with a diverse range of projects delivered and working in collaboration with individuals, groups and organisations and it has been an honour and a privilege to do so. There is always more that needs to be communicated, supported and to raise awareness of diaspora issues that are underrepresented.

To receive an OBE in the Platinum Jubilee New Year's Honour's List was very poignant. The Commonwealth is about working together and building friendships, longevity and respect as sovereign countries. It's what we at Multicultural Cumbria do on a local level and look forward to continuing to enable positive change.

UKRAINE

Ukraine War February 2022



Krystian Klicki owner of Polish Shop Dino with volunteer Laura Cooper

Krystian owns a chain of Polish Shops, Dino and wanted to do something to help his Ukrainian neighbours. He began using his own businesses as drop-off points for donations. Multicultural Cumbria set up a page on our website with locations around the county to collect for Ukraine. MCC used their networks to help in many ways to connect to the right people behind the scenes.

Kingmoor Park

Multicultural Cumbria was very kindly given storage space by Kingmoor Park to store and sort donations for Ukraine.





DEC Appeal Fundraiser

Multicultural Cumbria connected with Ukrainians in Carlisle. We contacted Carlisle United and organised the Ukrainian community to go to a match in March 2022, and collect money for the Ukraine DEC appeal, raising £2,318.



Iceland storage

Krystian's landlord owned the old Iceland Store and offered its use to Krystian as a packing building. We helped get in volunteers for packing, who themselves as People Seeking Asylum, were only too happy to help others, despite their own circumstances.

One Thought.

At Culture Bazaar 2020 Richard O'Neill and Michelle Russell met for the first time and got on so well, they created a story during the Covid-19 pandemic. This story was inspired by Raj Kumari-Byford who founded One Thought Changes All (1TcA).

They wanted to support the Ukrainians and help to translate their book into Ukrainian, which is when we connected them to Alla Stoica, who had fundraised for her fellow Ukrainians at the CUFC football match in March."

ASYLUM & REFUGEE

In April 2022 the Home Office decided to acquire hotels to house People Seeking Asylum in the UK. There was no funding or support to local authorities or third-sector organisations at the time. The hotels are managed by SERCO, contracted by the government, to provide accommodation and three meals a day. 150 men were transferred to a Carlisle hotel within days. The men were in need of basic essentials such as clothes, shoes, underwear, coats and personal hygiene products.


Count of Child's ethnic origin:

Carlisle City Council Organised Community Event in Bitts Park
















Race 2B 2022 Conference



The Ukraine invasion by Russia in February 2022, had a significant impact on what we were doing to support the Ukrainian community. Shortly after, in April, came the appointed hotels for People Seeking Asylum with 150 men, of which 70% were under the age of 26. Countries of origin include Eritrea, Iran, Iraq, Afghanistan, Syria, and other countries where their life was in danger.

Our digital needs went up significantly and we were fortunate enough to have acquired two Digital Assistants for six months. With additional short term support for the CEO during an extremely busy time.
